Packing List Discussion

This is to complement the attached packing list, with advice on packing and what kind of equipment to buy.

When packing, please be mindful of the following:

Space: There will only be two bags allowed for students: a carry-on sized roller bag, and a backpack. Souvenirs should be small and no extra items should be brought. Do not pack a large towel.

Organization: Use Ziploc bags in order to compartmentalize different items such as underwear, socks, and shirts. Students are expected to pack and repack bags every day and night. Ziploc bags will also protect from water damage.

Gifts: Are your gifts at the bottom of the bag? Are they resistant to heat or moisture? Make sure that you pack in such a way that your gifts for your host family will be protected against damage while in your checked bag. Do not pack things like chocolate, which will melt, or crackers, which will turn to dust.

Bags:

• Main Bag: All students need a carry-on sized roller bag. You can find examples of good bags below, all of which came priced at \$23 to \$40. The dimensions of these are roughly 22" x 14" x 9." This is the largest-sized carry-on permitted by airlines. If you have any questions, please check with Odyssey staff.









• Day Pack: This should be like a typical backpack for school. The daypack should be comfortable – remember you are climbing a mountain with it on your back! Criteria include: adjustable straps, big enough to hold all the items indicated for "day pack" in the pack list, and outside pockets to allow quick access to a change purse or water. No wheels or messenger-style bags.

Clothing:

- Under-clothing, including socks, should be easy to wash and hang-dry as well as antimicrobial to prevent smell.
- Uniform clothes: Odyssey will provide the Odyssey uniform collared shirts indicated in the pack list. Students will need to bring 3 pairs of Dockers-style khaki colored pants to be worn as part of their uniform. The pants should be wrinkle-resistant. One pair of the khaki pants can be shorts with at least a 6-inch inseam, or a knee-length skirt.
- Rain Jacket/Shell: Pack a waterproof outer layer to protect against unpredictable weather and to keep warm on Mt. Fuji. This should just be a shell and should layer with your fleece jacket.
- Footwear: We will be walking a considerable amount every day in Japan, in addition to hiking up Mt. Fuji, which may be covered in snow. It also may rain significantly while we are there, so make sure shoes are waterproof and athletic. Light hiking boots are recommended.
- Cultural appropriateness: Japanese people tend to cover their shoulders, so we ask students to not bring tank tops. Likewise, we ask that students not bring make-up as it is inappropriate for their age group on a school trip. Students will also be required to tuck in their shirts on uniform days and make other efforts in their personal hygiene regimens in order to look presentable in Japan.

Gifts:

• Host Family Gift: It is customary to bring a gift with you when visiting a home in Japan. Since Japanese houses are small and tend to get cluttered easily, it's best to give something consumable. Goods that you can only find in California (such as nuts or dried fruit, which are expensive items in Japan) are the best. Do not give a gift with an even number of items (like a set of 4 postcards) because that is seen as unlucky. We will bring gifts unwrapped and wrap them while in Japan. Try not to make the gift too expensive as it can shame the host family.



- Host Student Gift: Shinonome host students are around the same age as an Odyssey student, and Tokiwagi students are older (16/17 years old), but both will be interested and excited in anything very culturally American. Small memorabilia with English phrases or sports team logos, cute American stationery, a mix CD with music you like these are thoughtful gifts that reflect your personality without being too over-the-top or culturally insensitive in any way.
- Small stationary: It will be necessary to write thank you letters for homestays and their families, and some small stationary is better than note paper.
- Small Travel Gifts: Students will want to give something small to the many people who will have helped them with their cultural project. Gift items like stickers, bookmarks, pencils, or hard candy are easy to carry around.

Other Items:

- Camera: A disposable camera, or digital camera is recommended to take pictures. Make sure to bring a charger with a two-pronged wall plug. Students will not be bringing mobile phones to Japan.
- Headphones: Students may bring a set of small earbuds for use on the airplane.
- Pack-Towel: This is a small camping towel you can find at REI. Do not bring a large bath towel as you will not be able to dry it.
- Feminine products: You can buy these items in convenience stores in Japan, but many find American versions to be more comfortable in their familiarity.
- Money: Odyssey covers all trip expenses. Students should bring 30,000 yen (\$300) for: snacks/drinks, souvenirs for family, souvenirs for sibs, replacing lost items. Please have students come with their money in two envelopes with their name and the dollar amount on each envelope. The envelopes should have 15,000 yen (about \$150) each. Students will be responsible for their own spending money.

Field Trip Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement

In consideration of the Student named below (the "Student") being permitted to participate in Odyssey School's ("School") field trip to Japan (the "Field Trip"), the undersigned, parent(s) or legal guardian(s) of the Student, on behalf of my/our heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, and on behalf of the Student, hereby agree(s) to the following terms and conditions set forth below:

- **1. Participation:** Permission is granted for the Student to participate in the Field Trip from May 7, 2017 through May 28, 2017. I/We understand and acknowledge that certain risks are inherent in this type of excursion and I/we assume liability and responsibility for any such risks associated with participation in the Field Trip.
- 2. <u>Behavioral Expectations</u>: I/We understand and acknowledge that the Student is expected to abide by all School regulations during the course of the Field Trip. I/We agree that School has the right to terminate the Student's participation in the Field Trip for any behavior deemed detrimental to the School, the program or to the Student.
- **3. Early Return of Student:** I/We understand and acknowledge that, if the Student violates any School regulation during the course of the Field Trip or participates in behavior that is deemed detrimental to the School, the program or the Student, the Student will immediately be sent home at parent's expense.
- **4.** Acknowledgment of Risks: Field Trip activities may be dangerous and include risks that are inherent to the activities and cannot reasonably be avoided without changing the nature of the activity. Participation in the activities can cause personal injury, including emotional trauma and even death. The School cannot foresee every possible contingency or completely eliminate all risk. I/We have had opportunities to discuss the Field Trip with School, the Head of School or other School administrators.

- **5.** <u>Assumption of Risks</u>: I/We acknowledge and expressly assume all risks and dangers associated with all Field Trip activities, regardless of whether described above, are known or unknown or are inherent or otherwise. I/We take full responsibility for any injury or loss, including death, which Student may suffer, arising in whole or in part from the enrollment and participation of the Student in the activities of the trip.
- **6. <u>Hold Harmless</u>:** I/We acknowledge that, as a condition of the Student's participation in this Activity, I/we hold harmless and waive any and all claims against the School, its officers, directors, trustees, volunteers and employees, including, but not limited to, claims arising out of ordinary negligence of any officers, directors, trustees, volunteers and employees of the School, or any loss or damage to personal property occurring during or by reason of the Student participating in this Field Trip.

- **9.** <u>Indemnification</u>: The Student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) further agree to defend and indemnify the School, its officers, directors, trustees, volunteers and, employees for any action or claim commenced by parent(s)/guardian(s) or on behalf of parent(s)/guardian(s), or for any action commenced by the Student or on behalf of the Student, arising out of or in any way related to the above described Field Trip, including but not limited to a claim for bodily injury, personal injury, emotional distress, property damage and/or wrongful death arising out of ordinary negligence during the course of the Field Trip.
- 10. Pre-Existing Medical Condition of Student: I/We release School and its officers, directors, trustees, volunteers, and employees from all claims and liability for any illness, injury, loss of property and/or death resulting during or after the program from a pre-existing medical (physical, emotional and/or psychological) condition of the Student. I/We have read and completed fully confidential medical forms provided by School at the beginning of the school year. I/We accept full responsibility for omissions or errors on the medical information form. To the best of my/our knowledge, the Student has no medical (physical, emotional or psychological) conditions that would interfere with his/her ability to participate in the Field Trip or would otherwise endanger his/her health while participating in this program.
- 11. <u>Medical Care</u>: Any School officer, director, trustee, volunteer, or employee is authorized to obtain immediate medical attention for Student. I/We consent to whatever examination, x-ray, anesthetic, medical, surgical or dental diagnosis or treatment and hospital care are considered necessary in the best judgment of the attending physician, surgeon or dentist and performed by or under the supervision of the medical staff of the hospital or facility furnishing medical or dental services.
- 12. <u>Photo or Likeness of Students are School Property</u>: I/We understand that photographs, video or likenesses of Student become the property of School who may use the photographs for publicity purposes such as in School publications, promotions or the School website.
- 13. <u>Severability</u>: If any provision of this Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect.
- **14.** Entire Agreement: This Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement constitutes a single, integrated contract expressing the entire agreement of the parties hereto. There are no other agreements, written or oral, express or implied, between

the parties, concerning Expedition Japan, except this agreement. This Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement may be modified or superseded only in a written instrument to this agreement that specifically references this Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement and is executed by all parties.

15. <u>Voluntary Agreement</u>: Student and the parent(s)/guardian(s) acknowledge that they have read this Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement and are aware of the legal consequences of signing this binding document.

I/We have taken steps to become informed about the Field Trip and certify that I/we are satisfied with the nature and quality of the Field Trip as a voluntary activity for the student. I/We have read this Permission, Waiver, Release, and Indemnity Agreement. I/We understand that signing this agreement is voluntary and that I/we have been given the opportunity to seek legal counsel and to question Stephen Lane before signing this binding document.
